**PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS**

**Field Trip to Mt Tanglefoot and Surrounds – Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> April 2010**

Leaders: Alison and Peter Rogers

22 members met on the Myers Creek Rd, Healesville, travelling to the Mt St Leonard car park for a quick morning tea. The birds were close by in the scrub with a lyrebird calling in the distance.

Our first stop was the Wirrawilla Rainforest walk. A walk along the boardwalk provided good fungi and luscious ferns with a good sighting of a Crescent honeyeater yet another highlight.

From here we travelled in convoy to the Tanglefoot Picnic area for our lunch. Our short walk after lunch was accompanied by a lyrebird calling close by. Highlights here included Flame robins and yet more fungi.

We moved further into the Murrundindi park visiting an unburnt area along Vince's Track. Here the Mountain Correa (*Correa lawrenciana*) was in full flower with Eastern spinebills provided entertainment whilst visiting these bells for pollen. Crescent Honeyeaters were also heard in this area.

## PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS (CONT)

### Field Trip to Mt Tanglefoot and Surrounds (cont)

Moving down the mountain through the burnt areas, most members had not seen the devastation caused by the horrific 2009 fires. Our normal haunts, including The Cascades carpark, were unrecognisable and desolate. We stopped along the road to look down on the 3 falls making up the Cascades. These falls could be seen easily through the naked tree trunks, totally exposed with rocks and water visible. The very hot fire had removed most of the vegetation, but we were delighted to see signs of life with *Lamandra*, *Goodenia*, *Acacias* and other small herbage starting to appear.

Before leaving the State Forest we stopped again, this time at the Murrundindi Scenic Reserve area that we have visited many times as a group. This park area has been devastated and is now being redeveloped and hopefully will be ready for visiting soon. The Swinging Bridge has gone and hopefully will be rebuilt along with the picnic tables and camping areas. The call of a couple of Lyrebirds in the distance valley gave us an indication that all will be well again in this area.



### Autumn Camp 2010 – Nagambie – 15-16 May 2010

The Club held its autumn ‘camp-out’, at Nagambie on the weekend 15/16 May. 20 members and 1 visitor attended during the weekend. Most members made their base in the Lake Nagambie Caravan Park. Those who arrived early on the Friday afternoon spent time looking around the area and at the birds on Lake Nagambie.

Saturday’s itinerary began with a visit to the old Graytown POW camp, where the Noisy friarbirds provided constant chatter. From here we travelled through the bush in the Heathcote-Graytown National Park, stopping occasionally to look around in the roadside woodlands. We had lunch in beautiful sunny conditions at the base of Mt Black. Here we were fortunate to see Scarlet Honeyeaters and a Brown goshawk. Our afternoon took us through the remainder of the National Park, stopping often to look at the roadside vegetation. We ended up at the Balaclava Mine Visitor Centre in the Whroo Historic Reserve after checking out the old Puddling machine.

Saturday highlights included:

- 62 birds recorded for the day with special sightings of Noisy Friarbirds, Little Friarbirds, Scarlet Honeyeaters, Spotted Quail-thrush, Blue-faced Honeyeater, Fuscous Honeyeater and Purple-crowned Lorikeets

### Autumn Camp 2010 – Nagambie (cont)

- Beautiful stands of Australian Grass-trees
- 8 species of orchids (including *Pterostylis parviflora* (Tiny greenhood), *Pterostylis revoluta* (Large autumn greenhood), *Eriochilus cucullatus* (Parson's Bands), and *Acianthus pusillus* (Small mosquito orchid).

An early start on Sunday morning took us to the Tahbilk Wetlands and Wildlife Reserve. In the first 100 metres we saw an eastern water rat feeding in the reeds and crested shrike tits looking for insects high in the leaves of a eucalyptus. We walked for over 2 hours along the wetland paths which wandered near the river billabongs and some bush areas. Lunch was enjoyed near the historic part of the Tahbilk winery. In the afternoon, we took a Tahbilk Wetlands Cruise, travelling on the water and seeing the Wetlands from the river. Lovely reflections, tall gum trees, many water birds and the colony of flying foxes we had seen earlier in the day were observed on our leisurely trip. Sightings of an Azure kingfisher and a couple of Tawny frogmouths on the riverside completed a memorable weekend.

Sunday highlights included:

- 56 birds recorded for the Wetlands including 5 new sightings to add to their list
- Special sightings included White-breasted Wood swallow, White-bellied Cuckoo-shrike, Brown Quail and Olive-backed Orioles
- A sighting of Eastern Water Rat
- The colony of Flying foxes roosting in the trees alongside the wetland
- A leisurely cruise through the Tahbilk Wetlands.

Everyone had a great weekend, with some members staying for a few extra days.

### Field Trip to Koomba Park Wantirna - 19th June 2010

On a sunny but cool Saturday afternoon, 14 members and 1 visitor met at the Wantirna Recreation Reserve.

Our walk led to the track which runs parallel to the Dandenong Creek. Within a short distance there was a clump of Acacias which had many grey mistletoes (*Amyema quandang*) growing on them. Here yellow-winged Honeyeater is spotted amongst the mistletoe almost all year round. The group meandered up to Boronia Road car-park, passing by many magnificent Eucalypts.

After a short stop we split into two groups. Helen led eight members into the Winton Wetlands. The remaining members returned with Graeme via the new cycle/walking track, stopping along the way back by the open paddocks hoping to spot a Flame Robin that had been spotted earlier on. Turning off the bike track we ventured onto the broad-walk and into the bird hide at Koomba Lake. Here we were able to spot a pair of Australasian Grebes. From here we returned to the car-park where after a short chat the bird count was taken, consisting of 35, plus four feral birds.

The excursion finished at approximately 4.00 p.m.

## PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS (CONT)

### Planting Day Pound Bend – 11<sup>th</sup> July 2010

13 members met with Vic Parks Rangers Kylie Penance and Adrian at the Pound Bend Picnic area where a tree planting morning had been organised. Members quickly divided themselves into small groups and for the next couple of hours planted, staked and put plant guards around over 300 plants indigenous to the area.

Eucalypts and Acacias were planted along the riverbank edge with members looking for spots where there was no overhead canopy. Lomandras were planted in the picnic area under the tall, established eucalypts.

The Rangers provided morning tea and we were accompanied by some friendly kookaburras. The whole time we were working we were serenaded by rainbow lorikeets, magpies, galahs, currawongs and a grey butcherbird.

By the end of the morning we felt we had achieved a good morning's work. Weeks later the majority of plants are still looking good, probably due to the good rain that we have had over the past few weeks.

### Field Trip to Heritage Wetlands - 18<sup>th</sup> July 2010

A large flock of Cattle Egrets in a paddock on the access road provided a welcome introduction to the Heritage Wetlands. 15 members enjoyed a cold but sunny morning strolling through the bush and wetlands between the Heritage Golf Course and the Yarra River. It was good to see well-established growth of the indigenous revegetated areas being well used by birds and kangaroos. Highlights of the walk included a low-flying Wedge-tailed Eagle, a Collared Sparrowhawk, a female Darter and a good sighting of Striated Pardalotes from the bridge. The water level in the river was higher than had been seen for a long time – a welcome sight after years of drought. 45 bird species were recorded.

We drove to Jumping Creek Reserve for lunch and then enjoyed a short walk along the river where the side of the gorge was lined with lush green mosses, ferns and a few orchids, mainly *Pterostylis nutans* and *Pterostylis melagramma*. The weather then deteriorated as we took the inland track back to the car park after a very satisfying Winter field trip.

## PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS (CONT)

### Field Trip to Eagles Nest and Valley Picnic Areas, Silvan

– 15<sup>th</sup> August 2010

The forecast was not looking good with possible gale force winds and heavy rain. Twelve hardy members met at Silvan Reservoir in mild cool conditions with a few spots of rain. The decision was made to see how the weather turned out so we moved off. Arriving at Eagles Nest Picnic Area we had a quick morning tea, rugged up and made sure umbrellas were handy.

The tall eucalypts interspersed with acacias provided the canopy with green tree ferns, *Spyridium parvifolium* and some *Pimelea flava* a beautiful understorey. Although the rains during the preceding weeks had freshened up the bush, it appeared we would see little for the day with even the birds quiet. We started on the loop walk and had not walked far when light rain started to fall. Fortunately this was intermittent with only a very light breeze.

The further we walked the more of interest we found. Some fungi was scattered along the track and birds started to show themselves after awhile. Birding highlights included a very good sighting of the Large billed scrubwren to the accompaniment of song by a lyrebird. Fungi highlights included a large population of the leathery shelf fungus *Stereum illudens* and small set of Earth Stars.

We were scheduled to visit Valley Picnic Area for a further walk, and for those inclined, stay for a picnic lunch. By the time we had arrived at the Valley Picnic Area heavy rain had returned, effectively washing out any further activities.

### Field Trip to Boomers Reserve and Ironbark Road Reserve

- 4<sup>th</sup> September 2010

Nine intrepid Field Naturalists ignored severe weather warnings to visit Boomers Reserve where they enjoyed a feast of orchids, wattles, heaths and other early spring flowers. Fortunately the worst of the weather bypassed Melbourne and only slight drizzle hampered the photographers. Eight orchid species were in full flower and several others were in bud or leaf. Wine-lipped Spider Orchids (*Arachnorchis oenochila*) were flowering at the top of the hill. Acres of *Acacia genistifolia* provided a spectacular backdrop for the smaller plants. Scarlet Robins and Brown-headed Honeyeaters were bird highlights for the day.

After lunching in a rotunda in a Panton Hill park, eight of the group travelled to Ironbark Road Reserve at Diamond Creek where many other orchid species were observed, including Slaty Helmet Orchids (*Corybas incurvus*) and Small Gnat Orchids (*Cyrtostylis reniformis*). One member who had visited the reserve over many years said this year's orchid display was the best she had ever seen, possibly due to the heavy winter rains. As we returned to the car park a magnificent rainbow spanned the sky - a fitting finale to a most enjoyable field trip.
